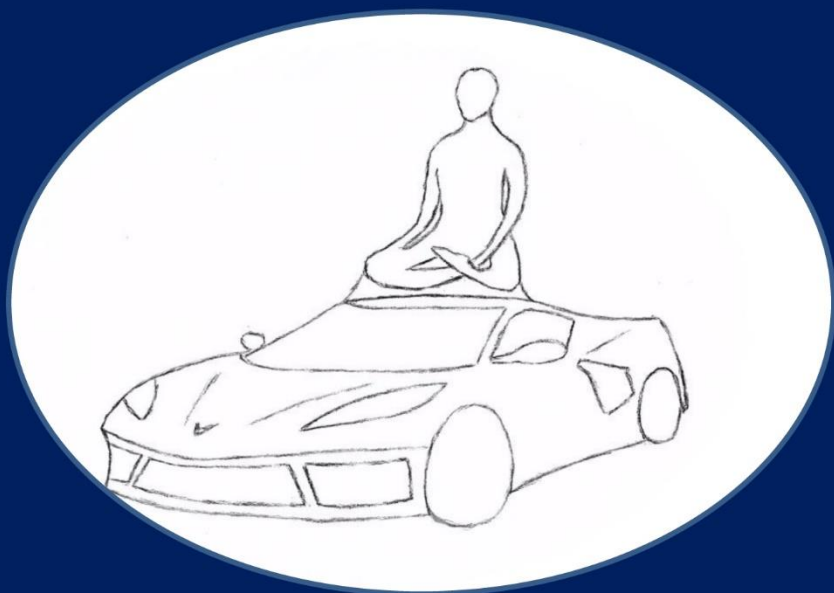

As Mikey approached the age of 12 years, his parents decided that it

would be best to find a Guru for him. They made this decision because of his giving and loving nature, and his constant engaging in meditation and inner reflection. They felt it was the right course, really the only course for his life. This was not a decision made lightly because it meant that once Mikey was with a guru in an ashram they may not see their son again for a very long time, possibly not for many years.

While searching for a guru, and during what his parents felt may be his

last year in school while living in their home, Mikey was provided a tutor for his subject in the sciences. Upon arriving the guru had a welcoming smile, but it was recognized by Mikey's parents that the guru was a stern man, a strict disciplinarian. disciplined approach to the things in life. The guru could see the hope of Mikey's parents and assured them that they had nothing to fear, that his approach of molding young disciples through righteousness had been successful for many years and that he was confident the techniques would be successful in helping Mikey.

Mikey's parents embraced their young man-child and felt comfortable that Mikey would be in good care with this guru who had a very confident

approach, even though it seemed a little unmalleable. His parents left and they cried on the way home knowing how much they would miss their son. Mikey too was a bit more torn about the separation from his parents than he felt he would be. The guru recognized the reaction and knew it was best to let it work itself out.

As weeks passed at the ashram, Mikey worked to fulfill the expectations of his guru. The guru typically guided his disciples by pointing out their flaws,

and providing corrective guidance to their thoughts through which the disciples understood and pursued the correct line of thinking. The guru's approach in changing thought translated into the correct action, a manifestation of correct thought.

Though the guru watched Mikey carefully and spent time focusing on the inner being of Mikey, he found it difficult to correct any of Mikey's actions and consequently thought processes. Because Mikey was such a

loving person the only flaw which seemed apparent was that he was too loving...which of course was not a flaw at all.

This loving personality characteristic the guru saw in Mikey was somewhat foreign to him and so he continued keeping a close observance of his newest disciple. One issue the guru eventually realized was that the other disciples were being influenced by Mikey's love, which seemed to provide a change in them. The guru recognized

that they, the other disciples, were becoming more loving themselves and as such were not as dedicated to correcting their inner flaws as they were in expressing a loving attitude in all of their activities. This meant the disciples were getting along better with each other because they were more accepting of each other, but the guru saw this as a setback reflecting less devotion to the "inner work" he had identified individually for them. The guru was immersed in a righteous approach to finding God where as Mikey's natural

disposition was a loving approach, and the guru felt this was adversely impacting the other disciples.

Mikey had no issues with the regimentation of the guru, but the guru continually tried to suppress the love Mikey expressed toward all because of the impact it had on the other disciples, and the effect it was having on the guru's approach to disciple training. loving approach Mikey did not recognize it, but for the guru it became a constant challenge to train the disciples through his rigid approach. It was for that reason alone the guru decided that having Mikey at the ashram was a poor fit.

was often very stern, and so one day

The next day the guru found it impossible to continue with his training by any means other than love. The guru became quite disoriented and spent an entire day meditating about it. FINDING THE RIGHT GURU

Through some friends Mikey's parents heard about a guru living near them, less than an hour's drive from their home. They also learned that this guru was very selective about taking on new disciples, but if accepted a disciple was almost assured success on the spiritual path in life. This time Mikey's parents contacted the guru and made an appointment to meet with him, without the accompaniment of their son. On the day of the appointment they travelled to

see this guru without Mikey so that they could focus on meeting and developing an understanding about him, and the approach he used with his disciples.

When Mikey's parents arrived at the ashram they saw no sign of welcome which made them feel a bit odd. They approached the door to the ashram and knocked. A disciple opened the door and smiling at them he motioned them to follow him as he lead them into the home which served as the ashram. In the parlor they found the guru sitting in

the middle of the room with the disciples surrounding him. The guru, upon seeing Mikey's parents, got up to greet them and before they could speak he said, "welcome, you are the parents of a child for whom you seek a guru and you called to come and meet with me. As they were looking at each other, the guru smiled and told them not to worry, they had made a good decision. Then he asked if they would like some tea and perhaps a tour of the ashram. They declined the offer of tea but readily accepted the invitation to see the

ashram. They were shown the garden area where the disciples grew food and learned about loving and caring for the plants they nurtured, and learned how mother earth can provide many of the necessities of life. They were shown the library with books for the disciples to study. They were also shown some bedrooms, a kitchen, the laundry facilities, and a number of other amenities of the ashram. One of the bedrooms they were shown was to be for Mikey, at the times he would be staying there. At this they asked what the guru

meant. The guru told them that because they lived relatively close, he would encourage Mikey to spend time with them so that he would maintain a familiarity with life outside of the ashram, and also so that he might enjoy the love of his family when time permitted it. his disciples. In fact, Mikey seemed to recognize him from dreams he had years ago when he was younger. The guru also recognized Mikey and was pleased that his new disciple, a loving manifestation of God, was now with him so he could help Mikey free his mind of the dross necessary to achieve the final goal on the spiritual path.

His parents left Mikey with the guru at the ashram and the guru spent the day familiarizing Mikey with the facilities. The guru gave Mikey some

In an attempt to help Mikey deal with the insecurity one day his guru asked Mikey if there were any issues bothering him, or anything he would like to talk about. Mikey looked at his guru

and got the feeling he knew about Mikey's developing insecurity, and yet he did not feel that it was the right time to discuss the issue, and he also felt a little embarrassed about it, so he told his guru that he did not want to discuss any issues with him at the moment. This response enabled him to be completely honest and at the same time avoid having to openly reveal the issue he had tried so hard to deal with. His guru smiled with understanding and told Mikey perhaps another time would be more appropriate.

One day, not long after the guru asked Mikey if there were any issues bothering him, his guru called Mikey to join him in the garden. There the guru was tending the plants. Some plants were flourishing and some were not. The guru pointed out to Mikey that the flourishing plants looked so healthy, so wonderful, that they did not need the same amount of love and attention as the plants that were not doing well. The guru explained it was the same with disciples. Some like Mikey were so full of love they did not require the outward

expression of love and attention, but others whose lives had been more challenging, needed to be shown love continually and in that way they were molded to be ever reflective of the Love of the Divine Creator. Mikey considered what his guru had told him and smiled, having had his insecurity instantly resolved with the simple explanation from his guru. Mikey thanked his guru and asked if he could remain and help tend the plants that needed it. His guru smiled back at him and said, "of course for together we will

always be helping nurture plants and people in this garden of life."

THE UNIQUE FAMILY OF A DISCIPLE

One day at the ashram the guru, while meditating on the lives of various disciples, became aware that one disciple's life was about to take a strange turn in the already sad and complex family of the disciple. The father of that particular disciple had been involved with corruption and graft for many years. He also enforced his business relationships by occasionally using extreme measures, much to the regret of

the recipients of the strong-arm tactics. What the Guru had seen through his meditation was, due to the severe conduct of the disciple's father, his father's life would end soon. The guru also saw that the family members who had benefitted from the malfeasance of the father would also suffer from the bad karma. The guru became concerned about the disciple and the impact of the upcoming karmic justice on his family. The guru talked with the disciple and explained that there would be some upcoming unfortunate events for his

family, and the guru felt the disciple would benefit the most by remaining at the ashram, even if his family tried to take him home. The disciple understood and promised to meditate about the situation.

Within a few days the family members of the disciple, including his mother and an aunt, along with a sister and brother, showed up to see him. His mother told the disciple his father had died, and asked him to come home for a little while. The disciple asked his

mother and other family members if he could have a day to consider the situation. The disciple had been at the ashram for several years and because his family had rarely visited him, he did not know much about the business his father had been engaged in, nor did his family members have any idea about his life at the ashram. The family agreed and told him they would return the following afternoon.

In meditating about the circumstances of his family, the disciple

became aware that his family had no intention of allowing him to come back to the ashram. The family members returned the next day. The disciple asked his family what would happen if he did not go home with them. He was told that he would be disowned as a family member never to be allowed to return to them again. He asked for a few minutes to speak to his guru, then realized that if he did take time to speak with his guru and then declined to go, they would blame the guru. So instead, he stayed and told his family that he did

not believe they had any intention of allowing him to return. He also told them he would come home when he was ready and if they were truly his family they would accept him whenever that happened to be. He then asked them to leave.

These particular circumstances had a profound impact on Mikey because Mikey had developed a close friendship with the disciple, and became aware of the disciple's family problems through their guru. Due to his guru's alerting

him to the disciple's issue, Mikey also meditated about the circumstances of the disciple and his family. From his meditation Mikey developed a significant understanding of what was happening to his disciple friend, and had never encountered such an outward expression of manipulation his friend was experiencing by his family. He also could see the influence of his guru on the disciple, and the disciple's ability to gain intuition about the situation that others might not have. These life circumstances reinforced Mikey's belief

that spiritual pursuit was the best path in life, and developing a relationship with God was important for everyone.

THE DISCIPLE OF QUESTIONABLE CHARACTER

There were new disciples who came occasionally, and once in a while some left. On one occasion when a new disciple came, Mikey received a lesson about the nature of people and how it is often hidden behind a smile and seemingly friendly demeanor.

The new disciple in question had joined the ashram and was friendly to everyone. He had a warm smile and was

quick to agree with people and listen patiently to their stories. As with all the new disciples, the guru attuned to this new disciple with techniques that allowed him to see a deeper character of the individual. What he saw was a bit of a surprise in that the inner character did not coincide with the outer friendly person.

The guru assigned the new disciple, whose name was David, the after dinner clean-up duties. It was also part of this duty to deliver desserts to the

disciples after dinner. Because of the inner nature the guru had seen, he was certain that David would take advantage of his opportunity to help himself with more than his portion of dessert, because one of his flaws was greed and another was over-eating. For a couple of days David performed his task without hidden motives, but on the third day a most amazing dessert had been prepared for the disciples, a chocolate mousse made in individual serving dishes for the disciples. This was something that David could not resist. While David

was busy in the kitchen, because it was his night to clean up after the meal, one of the other disciples was asked to help David serve the desserts. This request occurred while David was out of the dining room, and David was quite surprised to see the disciple walk into the kitchen only to find David eating one of the mousse desserts rather than cleaning up the dinner dishes.

The other disciple turned around and walked out. Almost immediately all of the disciples re-entered the kitchen to

watch David. Interestingly, no one said anything, but the disciple who was asked to help went to the refrigerator to get the desserts for the other disciples. He noticed that it did not appear there were enough desserts for everyone. Looking around he saw two additional dirty mousse dishes in the sink. The disciple turned to David and asked, "did you eat the two mousse desserts from those dishes in the sink?"

David turned very red and started to lie, yet knew it was to no avail. From

then on none of the other disciples went out of their way to associate with David, and before long the rejection was more than he could bear and he left the ashram to return to his old ways, leading to a challenging and painful life.

Even though the treatment of David seemed contrary to the foundation of the ashram, the other disciples also learned that the inclinations of someone like David's should not be encouraged nor tolerated, which is why they avoided him. Had David been sincere with an

apology, along with a commitment to make an effort to change his ways, all of the disciples would have helped him grow. Sadly it was not in David to apologize for his shortcomings nor have regret about his greed.

THE SELF-CENTERED DISCIPLE WHO CHANGED

Another situation occurred at the ashram that dealt with a disciple named Geoffrey, who happened to have a challenging personality, and was a bit egocentric. Mikey along with all of the other disciples tolerated Geoffrey's self centeredness partly from the training in the ashram, and partly due to the foundation of showing love for all. This basic foundation was to practice patience and tolerance for all, even other

disciples who had not yet fully absorbed the lessons of the ashram into their own character.

One day the parents of Geoffrey made a surprise visit to the ashram to see their son. They were taken aback when shown to some chairs in a waiting area, able to observe the disciples sitting around the guru listening to a discussion about some key points in the Bhagavad Gita, but receiving no formal greeting. without even requesting permission to do so from the guru. The guru smiled inwardly at this behavior, having already recognized the self indulgent traits in Geoffrey.

After greeting his parents, Geoffrey stood waiting to be acknowledged by the guru, for he wanted the guru to join his parents and give them the attention Geoffrey believed they were entitled to. The guru however ignored both Geoffrey and his parents, and continued with his

dissertation about the Gita. Normally, if the guru knew of a visit by the parents of a disciple ahead of time, the parents would be immediately welcomed and given due respect, but on this occasion the parents of Geoffrey did not provide any advanced notice of their visit. It was because of the lack of advance notice that the guru continued with his discourse until it was finished for the day, as if no visitors had arrived. It was another 45 minutes that Geoffrey's parents had to wait before being greeted by the guru.

Of course, Geoffrey was not happy about this treatment and intended to share his displeasure with the guru, yet when the discussion was finished the guru got up and with a genuine smile and inner warmth greeted Geoffrey's parents. The parents stood up not knowing what to say because they recognized that the guru was sincere, and they knew of course that they arrived without notice. Finally the father of Geoffrey apologized for the interruption. Then the guru also apologized for not being able to

acknowledge Geoffrey's parents immediately, and explained that the disciples were his number one priority, and the lessons he provided them from time to time helped them with their spiritual growth and progress. Geoffrey's parents said they understood and were happy to have waited and then have the opportunity to meet with the guru.

The guru recognized Geoffrey's feelings and inwardly knew it was an important lesson he was learning.

Geoffrey was a bit confused because his parents had always provided him whatever he said he needed, and yet his parents were now outwardly acknowledging the needs of the others. While Geoffrey was going through his inner turmoil, the guru offered tea to his parents, and engaged them in conversation letting them know the ashram was running very smoothly, and the disciples were progressing on their spiritual paths. The guru did not talk specifically about Geoffrey nor did Geoffrey's parents ask about his

progress. This also was a bit of a blow to Geoffrey because he wanted his parents to be proud of his progress, so this became something else for him to consider.

Geoffrey's parents eventually left the ashram after a very nice visit with the guru. After his parents left the ashram, Geoffrey approached the guru and thanked him for the hospitality he showed his parents. The guru, aware of Geoffrey's inner confusion, asked him if there was anything else on his mind

concerning the visit. Geoffrey said there was but he would rather not discuss it at that moment, that he needed to consider it for a while if that was ok with the guru, to which the guru smiled and said "yes". Then the guru said to Geoffrey, "we are all in this together, dependent on each other and not just ourselves. If this was not true, I would not have had a loving guru to provide me training, nor would I be here providing training for you and the other disciples. Because of this truth we must always consider others whom we find with us on our

paths, and show them the respect and consideration that we would like them to show us."

Geoffrey immediately understood the truth in the guru's words, and they had such a profound effect on him that he changed and abandoned his self-centered ways. Geoffrey learned a big lesson on his spiritual path that day, and it helped him look at his whole life differently from that point on.

Eventually Geoffrey left the ashram and became a teacher. His teaching position

was in a school with many students of his own to teach and guide along their way in life. The lesson he learned about not being selfish was the key he needed to open his mind to spiritual progress and succeed on his path as a teacher helping others.

MIKEY'S LIFE AT THE ASHRAM

As Mikey's stay at the ashram continued, it was obvious that his loving approach had a profound effect on all of the disciples. Many of the disciples sought out Mikey's help with personal issues when the guru was occupied or in deep meditation. The guru then told the professor that Mikey was his disciple. The professor was quite surprised and blushed. Then the professor, stripped of his ego, apologized and told the guru it would not happen again.

Mikey's college years sailed by for him, almost as a dream. During his time

in college he established a pattern of providing minimal attention to his assignments, attempting just enough work to achieve passing scores. This enabled him to spend more time with his guru, and he even found quality time to spend with his family. Mikey's parents were surprised that the decision was made for Mikey to attend college, and were delighted that even with college work he was able to spend some time with them. Of course Mikey's most important goal continued to be spending time with his guru, which he did on a

regular basis. His guru was pleased with his progress in college as well as his spiritual progress.

In 4 years Mikey graduated from college. After college he decided to stay at the ashram on a full time basis in order to spend more time with his guru, to which his guru did not object. Mikey still continued to visit his parents often, and life for Mikey didn't feel like it could be much better.

MIKEY BECOMES A MONK

after each candle lighting, asked Mikey to meditate on the words which were being spoken to him. The words were to guide Mikey's inner being and also help open his spiritual awareness. When the guru finished the candle lighting ceremony, he asked Mikey to stand and welcomed him as a monk.

Normally when a disciple became a monk, he would be involved in choosing his own name, but on this occasion Mikey's guru told Mikey that his name would be Dveshananda.

Mikey was bewildered about the name, knowing that "ananda" meant bliss and divine love, but Mikey was not familiar with "dvesh" and made a point to inquire about its meaning. When he felt the time was right, Mikey asked his guru about the meaning of dvesh, and his guru told him that it would be significant to him later in his life, and for now he should focus on the bliss and love part of his name, which had been part of his very being since the time of his birth.
